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\$99,426,562 205 GRANTS

The Duke Endowment's grantmaking reflects its commitment to nurture children, promote health, educate minds and enrich spirits.

We work through select organizations in North Carolina and South Carolina. The Duke Endowment approved 205 new grants, totaling over \$99.4 million, some of which will be paid in future years.

Nearly \$128 million was distributed through 338 grants, some of which were approved in previous years.
